Steps of History Fair Research

Read widely about a topic or time in history. A good starting place is a textbook, encyclopedia, or reputable history website.



As you read, **write down questions** that interest you. Record your sources and how they relate to your research.



Read more on your topic in both primary and secondary sources. Take notes. Look for ways to **compare, contrast, or interpret**. Write down any sources you used and how used.



Write a preliminary thesis statement and integrate the history fair theme such as:
My History Fair project will examine/compare/contrast/discuss/or show...



Do more reading and take more notes as needed to provide support for your thesis.



Using your notes, **make an outline** with topics and subtopics.



Write your intro, body of paper, and conclusions (research paper) **OR use your notes to create** a backboard/website/video.



Edit/revise based on teacher feedback until your final draft is ready to turn in!

Types of Primary Sources

Original, first-hand account of an event or time period that is usually written or made during or close to the event or time period.

Government documents

Court records
Census records and other data
Immigration records
Written/recorded speeches
Ship's logs

Publications

Maps *from the place or time*
Newspaper or magazine articles *from the place or time*

Personal records

Diaries
Memoirs and autobiographies
Letters
Photographs
Oral history interviews

Art/Popular Culture

Music and song lyrics
Paintings, drawings, and other art
Photography
Architecture
Posters, banners, and signs

Types of Secondary Sources

Second-hand account of an historical event or time period that analyzes and interprets primary sources.

Newspaper or magazine articles that interpret
Biographies
Textbooks
Encyclopedias
Criticisms and commentaries
